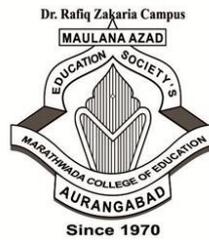

All though the syllabi are not framed by the College but by the University to which it is affiliated, so there was little scope of internal curriculum designing the College has its own Academic Calendar to run and complete the Syllabus.

- The faculty met at the beginning of each Academic Session for allocation of Syllabus assignments, contents, fix days for the practical activities and the Academic Calendar for the Session was prepared
- As the two years B.Ed course was introduce by NCTE, the university also accepted and extended the duration of the B.Ed course to two years. After the reopening the NCTE curriculum in the light of NCFW was analyzed by the faculty members.
- The CBCS system was studied and faculty meetings were held to discuss the expectations of NCTE from the two years B.Ed course.

- Detailed analysis of the theory and practical aspects of the syllabus was done.
- The syllabus prescribed by the university was inconsistent with NCTE, an analysis of university syllabus was done.
- Subject coordinators were appointed for measuring the extent of deviation of present designed syllabus of Dr. BAMU university Aurangabad with that of NCTE curriculum framework.
- Feedback from the stakeholders, teachers and students regarding the syllabus was taken.
- The feedback was discussed by the Board of Study Members in the University meeting and measures for refining the curriculum were given
- A detailed report was prepared and sent to the university authorities for the reforms in syllabus.
- Work load was distributed according to the activities prescribed by the Syllabus.
- Counseling for the students regarding the course and faculty was conducted after the admission procedure.
- Meetings were conducted at the end of the month to take the feedback and analysis was done. Organization of seminar, workshop, and paper reading was conducted.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

Our Institution adopts some innovative processes in teaching and learning.

- LMS(Learning Management System) was adopted by the faculty as an innovative approach
- Inter-active teaching and learning by class discussions, debates and seminars were conducted.
- Maximum use of Audio Vision Aids was done.
- Technology enabled teaching and learning process was practiced in the College.
- LCD Projectors and overhead projectors were used for teaching regularly.
- Tutorials were conducted weekly. Bright and weak students were identified and counseled.
- Evaluation in theory and practical was done on regular basis.
- Project work and dissertation work was carried out.

- Students were trained to prepare their lessons based on PowerPoint presentation.
- In methodology lectures every student were trained to prepare their teaching aids.
- ICT guidance was given to the students.
- Knowledge of conferencing was given with demonstration.
- Smart class for teaching was introduced.
- Collaborative teaching learning method was adopted.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

- As the B.Ed. and M.Ed. course duration was extended to two years, there was a change in examination pattern. In M.Ed. the semester pattern was adopted by the university.
- Internal examination and evaluation – students were evaluated continuously through check list, observation, descriptive test, content test and college theory exams.
- External examination and evaluation – annual examination was conducted by the University in three phases i.e. Final lessons, Viva voce and University theory exam.
- Regular class tests and tutorials were conducted for training the Students for the Annual Exams.
- Students were given guidance for writing the applicative type answers.
- Students were guided for how to appear for viva-voce final exam.

- The faculty attended in 4 State level Seminars and presented 00 papers.
- 10 members from the faculty attended State level conferences and 2 of them presented papers.

- 4 of the faculty attended National level workshops and 1 of them presented paper.
- 5 of the faculty worked as Chairman in the University practical exams.

ACTION TAKEN REPORT

Every year feedback from the students is collected in order to know the areas where improvement is required; college also strives to bring improvement in the areas if it is under the purview of the college.

This year (2015-2016) the areas highlighted by the students are mostly those which do not fall under the purview of the institution.

On the basis of the feedback received from the students, following cognizance has been taken.

1. Flexibility of coverage of course -

Thirty students are unsatisfied with the flexibility of course coverage; the reason may be no optional papers in First year of the B.Ed. course. It should be kept in mind that the syllabus is designed by the University since our college is affiliated to the University we have to follow the syllabus prescribed by the University.

Our staff members have analysed the syllabus prescribed by the University and recommended the Vice-chancellor and the Director BCUD for revision of the syllabus.

2. Duration of course -

Twenty eight students are unsatisfied with the duration of the course; the reason may be the extension of the course from one year to two years. The extension of the duration of the course was long due; NCTE has made it mandatory for all the colleges of teacher education courses of the country to extend the duration to two years from the academic year 2015-2016.

3. Printing facility in IT Lab -

Sixty two students are not satisfied with printing facility. The printing facility in IT lab is not available but two photo copiers are going to be kept in the Library, in the latest development four printers are added in the IT lab. Moreover, the budgetary provision does not permit to provide printing facilities to the students.

4. Availability of latest IT equipment –

100 students have shown satisfactory remark regarding the availability of latest IT equipment. At the time of collecting feedback the college was going through major overhauling in IT department, computers are now upgraded, ten new PCs are purchased. All the students are enrolled in the data base for bio metric, face detection, and RF ID is being issued to every student for lecture to lecture attendance.

The college library is upgraded to the latest technology - e-library is being introduced, the accession and issuance of books are made with the help of bio-metric system.

5. **Hostel facility –**

Seventy students are not satisfied with the hostel facility. There is hostel facility in the college campus itself, the hostel is well furnished, but this hostel is only for boys. There are several girls hostel located in and around the college campus; a committee is formed to ensure safety and security of the girls in these hostels and also whether these hostels are providing clean and hygienic environment.

6. **Transport facility –**

Twenty students are not satisfied with the transport facility; on the contrary the college is having a good network of transport facility. City buses and auto rickshaw ply regularly; the college is in the city centre. The management is in talks with the controller of city bus and ask him to increase the frequency of the buses towards the college.

- 1) Title of the practice: **KNOWLEDGE DISSEMINATION CELL**
- 2) Initiation of the practice :Marathwada College of Education has always been the centre of excellence for providing World class quality teacher education to the trainees from all the sections of the society. An attempt to strengthen the collaboration with the schools of Aurangabad city a Knowledge Dissemination cell was established in the institution. The main aim of the cell was to solve the teaching learning problems of the teachers in the schools. Expertise guidance of experienced teacher educators is made available to the finger tips of the school teachers in order to assist them in their daily teaching transaction.
- 3) Objectives:
 - To provide online assistance as well as help whenever they require.
 - To provide them tips to attain the teaching learning objectives.
 - To acknowledge the teachers with innovative teaching learning techniques.
 - To conduct orientations for school teachers.
 - To conduct ICT workshops to acquaint the school teachers with the use of ICT in teaching learning.
 - To make the teachers facilitators more than information givers.
- 4) The practice:

In the Headmasters meet held at the institution the headmasters were elaborated and acquainted with the innovative attempt i.e the knowledge dissemination cell started by the institution. The mechanism to address the difficulty and process of remediation was conveyed in the H.M's meet. Members as per their methodologies and specialization subjects were included to address the difficulties. Online as well as personal guidance was provided to the school teachers as and when required.
- 5) Obstacles faced:
 - Scarcity of time.
 - All the problems of the students cannot be understood online or by mere conversation, personal visit is required requires time.
- 6) Impact of the practice: The diagnostic practice to identify the learning deviant cases was accelerated in the schools. Clinical approach was used so the practice was scientific in nature and was accepted and implemented by the schools.

- 1) Title of the practice: **RIGHT TO EDUCATION(2009) HELPDESK COMMITTEE**
- 2) Initiation of the practice :Marathwada college of Education has always strived to provide affordable quality education and also to serve the underprivileged from all the sections of the society. During the Working with community drives it was noticed that there was lack of awareness among the people specially those living the slum areas. The Constitution (Eighty-sixth Amendment) Act, 2002 inserted Article 21-A in the Constitution of India to provide free and compulsory education of all children in the age group of six to fourteen years as a Fundamental Right in such a manner as the State may, by law, determine. The Right of Children to Free and Compulsory Education (RTE) Act, 2009, which represents the consequential legislation envisaged under Article 21-A, means that every child has a right to full-time elementary education of satisfactory and equitable quality in a formal school which satisfies certain essential norms and standards.

An attempt to acquaint and understand the government educational provisions for the socially and economically deprived classes, the institution started a committee who shall work for the social cause.

Objectives:

- Right of children to free and compulsory education till completion of elementary education in a neighborhood school.
- It makes provisions for a non-admitted child to be admitted to an age appropriate class.
- It specifies the duties and responsibilities of appropriate Governments, local authority and parents in providing free and compulsory education, and sharing of financial and other responsibilities between the Central and State Governments.
- It prohibits (a) physical punishment and mental harassment; (b) screening procedures for admission of children; (c) capitation fee; (d) private tuition by teachers and (e) running of schools without recognition.

- 3) The practice:

For the upliftment of the students of weaker socioeconomic status, the Marathwada College of Education has established RTE Help Desk. In the purview of RTE Act 2009, it is mandatory to keep 25% seats for economically backward students. Most of the parents of slum areas belonging to low socio-economic status are unaware of this act and their wards are deprived of education. For making such parents aware of the law and act and help them to seek admissions in high profile English medium schools, Marathwada College of Education, Aurangabad has initiated about this social cause and started a help desk in the college to get admission for their children in high profile schools as the judgment passed by Hon. Supreme Court of India.

During the working with community the students were provided with a special data sheet which comprises of the information related to the socio-economic status. The data was analyzed by the committee and the aspiring parents willing to send their wards in high profile schools were called and acquainted with the Right to education (2009)Act.

- 4) Obstacles faced:
- Non-cooperation from the high profile schools.
 - Psychology of the parents.
 - Illiteracy of the parents.
- 5) Impact of the practice: The committee has covered a slum area near to the institution and few of the cases are in progress. The practice helped in spreading the educational provisions via Right to education (2009) Act in the under privileged sections of the society.
